Gazing Into The Future With Three Generations Of Star Trek

Recently, we became a part of Star Trek history by being present when, for the first time, three generations of Star Trek crew members came together over lunch to discuss the venerable history and visionary future they've helped create.

Present from the original series were George Takei and James Doohan (Sulu and Scotty respectively); representing Star Trek: The Next Generation was Michael Dorn (the resident Klingon, Lt. Worf); and from Star Trek: Deep Space Nine was Terry Farrell (Trill Science Officer, Lt. Dax).
